Under the Allocation of Duties to Officials of the Presidential Administration, oversaw interactions with the media, political parties, and the Central Electoral Commission during the 2007 State Duma election campaign that was characterized by "the extensive use of administrative resourceson behalf of United Russia" which constituted "an abuse of power and a clear violation of international commitments and standards" (Joint Statement by the Parliamentary Assembly of the
